1. A MEMBER ENTITLED TO ATTEND AND VOTE AT THE MEETING IS ENTITLED TO APPOINT PROXY/PROXIES TO ATTEND AND VOTE AND VOTE INSTEAD OF HIMSELF/HERSELF AND SUCH PROXY/PROXIES NEED NOT BE A MEMBER OF THE COMPANY.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 105 of the Companies Act, 2013, a person can act as a proxy on behalf of not more than fifty members and holding in aggregate not more than ten percent of the total Share Capital of the Company.

During the period beginning 24 hours before the time fixed for the commencement of the meeting and ending with the conclusion of the meeting, a member would be entitled to inspect the proxies lodged at any time during the business hours of the Company, provided not less than three days of notice in writing is given to the Company.

2. PROXY FORM AND ATTENDANCE SLIP ARE ENCLOSED, PROXIES IN ORDER TO BE VALID MUST REACH AT THE REGISTERED OFFICE OF THE COMPANY NOT LESS THAN 48 HOURS BEFORE THE COMMENCEMENT OF THE MEETING.
3. Pursuant to Section 91 of the Companies Act, 2013, the Register of Members and Share transfer Books of the Company will remain closed from 23rd September, 2021 to 29th September, 2021 (Both days inclusive).
4. The notice of Annual General Meeting will be sent to those members / beneficial owners whose name will appear in the register of members / list of beneficiaries received from the depositories as on 27th August, 2021.
5. As per the of Section 72 of Companies Act, 2013, facility for making nominations is now available to Individuals holding shares in the Company. Members holding shares in physical form may obtain the Nomination form from its RTA. Members holding shares in electronic form have to approach their Depository Participants (DPs) for completing nomination formalities.
6. Members are requested to notify immediately changes in their respective address, if any, to the Company's Registered Office quoting their Folio no.
7. Members who hold shares in the Dematerialized form are requested to bring their Client ID and DP ID numbers for easy identification of attendance at the Annual General Meeting.
8. The Company has made necessary arrangements for the members to hold their shares in dematerialized form. Those members who are holding shares in physical form are requested to dematerialize the same by approaching any of the Depository Participants (DPs). In case any member wishes to dematerialize his/her shares and needs any assistance, he/she may write to the Company at the Corporate Office of the Company.
9. Members/Proxies should bring their copy of the Annual Report and also the attendance slip duly filled in for attending the meeting.
10. Copies of Annual Report 2021 are being sent by electronic mode only to all the members whose email addresses are registered with the Company/Depository Participants) for communication purposes unless any member has requested for a hard copy of the same. For members who have not registered their email addresses, a message has been sent on their registered mobile number.
11. The notice of the 60th AGM and instructions for e-voting, along with the Attendance Slip and Proxy Form, is being sent by electronic mode to all members whose email addresses are registered with the Company/Depository Participant (s) of the same.
12. The Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) has mandated the submission of the Permanent Account Number (PAN) by every participant in the securities market. Members holding shares in electronic form are, therefore, requested to submit their PAN to their Depository Participant (s). Members holding shares in physical form shall submit their PAN details to the Company/RTA.

1. Voting through electronic means:

In compliance with provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 and Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014, the Company is pleased to provide

members facility to exercise their right to vote at the 60th Annual General Meeting (AGM) by electronic means and the business may be transacted through e-voting Services provided by Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL). The Company has signed an agreement with CDSL for facilitating such e-voting by the Members. Kindly note that each Member can opt for only one mode for voting i.e. either by Physical ballot or by E-voting. However, in case members cast their vote both via physical ballot and e-voting, then voting through postal ballot shall prevail and voting done by e-voting shall be treated as invalid.

The instructions for shareholders voting electronically are as under:

- (i) The voting period begins on 27th September, 2021 at 9.00 am and ends on 29th September, 2021 at 5.00 pm. During this period shareholders' of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date (record date) i.e 23rd September, 2021 may cast their vote electronically. The e-voting module shall be disabled by CDSL for voting thereafter.
- (ii) Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue.
- (iii) The shareholders should log on to the e-voting website www.evotingindia.com.
- (iv) Click on Shareholders.
- (v) Now Enter your User ID
 - a. For CDSL: 16 digits beneficiary ID,
 - b. For NSDL: 8 Character DP ID followed by 8 Digits Client ID,
 - c. Members holding shares in Physical Form should enter Folio Number registered with the Company.
- (vi) Next enter the Image Verification as displayed and Click on Login.

- (xvi) Once you "CONFIRM" your vote on the resolution, you will not be allowed to modify your vote.

The performance of the board was evaluated by the board after seeking inputs from all the directors on the basis of criteria such as the board composition and structure, effectiveness of board processes, information and functioning, etc.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 149 of the Act, the independent directors have submitted declarations that each of them meet the criteria of independence as provided in Section 149(6) of the Act along with Rules framed thereunder and Regulation 16(1)(b) of the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 (“SEBI Listing Regulations”). There has been no change in the circumstances affecting their status as independent directors of the Company.

19. AUDITORS

The current auditor M/s Desai Associates, Chartered Accountants (registration number: 102286W), Mumbai have completed their term as per Section 139 of the Companies Act, 2013 and hence the Board recommended to appoint M/s. R. Bhargava and Associates, Chartered Accountants (FRN: 0127887N) as the Statutory Auditors of the Company for a period of five years, subject to the approval of shareholders at the ensuing Annual General Meeting till the conclusion of 65th Annual General Meeting.

The statutory audit report does not contain any qualification, reservation or adverse remark or disclaimer made by statutory auditor.

AUDIT COMMITTEE:

The composition of the Audit Committee is in alignment with provisions of Section 177 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with the Rules issued thereunder and Regulation 18 of the Listing Regulations. The members of the Audit Committee are financially sound and literate.

The Audit Committee conducted 4 meetings during the financial year under review.

Secretarial auditor

Your Board appointed M/s. Ragini Chokshi & Co, Practicing Company Secretaries, to conduct secretarial audit of the Company for the financial year ended 31st March, 2021.

The Report M/s. Ragini Chokshi & Co, Practicing Company Secretary is provided in the Annexure forming part of this Report, pursuant to Section 204 of the Companies Act, 2013.

As regards the Secretarial Audit report the comments are as under:.

- As per Section 203(1) & (4) of the Companies Act, 2013, the company is required to appoint a Chief Financial Officer on board. – The Company is in process of appointing the CFO in the next Board meeting.
- As per Regulation 13(3) of the SEBI (LODR), 2015, the company has filed the statement of investor complaints with Stock Exchange with delay of 2 days.
- As per Regulation 31 of the SEBI (LODR), 2015, the company submitted the statement of shareholding pattern to Stock Exchange by delay of 7 days.
- As per Regulation 30 of the SEBI (LODR), 2015, the company disclosed the outcome of the board meetings held on June 26, 2020; November 04, 2020 & February 02, 2021 to the Stock Exchange beyond the time limit of 30 minutes.
- As per Regulation 44(3) of the SEBI (LODR), 2015, the company submitted the voting results of Annual general meeting to the Stock Exchange with delay of 62 days.
- The Company has delayed filing of Form DPT-3 for the financial year ending March, 2020 - Due to the technical glitches and work from home because of novel corona virus pandemic the company delayed in above filings with the regulatory.

i. Share capital and share premium

Ordinary shares are classified as equity. Incremental costs directly attributable to the issue of new shares are shown in equity as a deduction net of tax from the proceeds. Par value of the equity share is recorded as share capital and the amount received in excess of the par value is classified as share premium.

J. Dividend Distribution to equity shareholders

The Company recognises a liability to make cash distributions to equity holders when the distribution is authorized and the distribution is no longer at the discretion of the Company. In preparing the Financial Statements, transactions in currencies other than the entity's functional currency are recognised at the rates of exchange prevailing at the dates of the transactions. At the end of each reporting period, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rates prevailing at that date. Non-monetary items denominated in foreign currency are reported at the exchange rate ruling on the date of transaction.

Exchange differences on monetary items are recognised in the Statement of Profit & Loss in the period in which they arise.

ii. Market risk

Market risk is the risk of changes in market prices – such as foreign exchange rates, interest rates and equity prices – will affect the Company's income or the value of its holdings of financial instruments. Market risk is attributable to all market risk sensitive financial instruments including foreign currency receivables and payables and long term debt. The Company is not exposed to market risk primarily related to foreign exchange rate risk.

iii. Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk can be either fair value interest rate risk or cash flow interest rate risk. Fair value interest rate risk is the risk of changes in fair values of fixed interest bearing investments/loans because of fluctuations in the interest rates. Cash flow interest rate risk is the risk that the future cash flows of floating interest bearing investments will fluctuate because of fluctuations in the interest rates.

Exposure to interest rate risk

Interest rate risk arises from borrowings. Borrowings issued at fixed rates exposes to fair value interest rate risk. The Company have borrowings in financial years 2017-18, 2018-19 without interest, accordingly there is no exposure to interest rate risk.

Note 24. Capital Management

For the purpose of the Company's capital management, capital includes issued capital and other equity reserves. The primary objective of the Company's Capital Management is to maximise shareholders value. The Company manages its capital structure and makes adjustments in the light of changes in economic environment and the requirements of the financial covenants.

The Company monitors capital using adjusted net debt to equity ratio. For this purpose, adjusted net debt is defined as total debt less cash and bank balances.

The Company have borrowings of Rs.8.10 lakh in financial years 2020-21 and Rs.8.10 Lakh in financial years 2019-20. . Hence, balance equity belongs to shareholders.

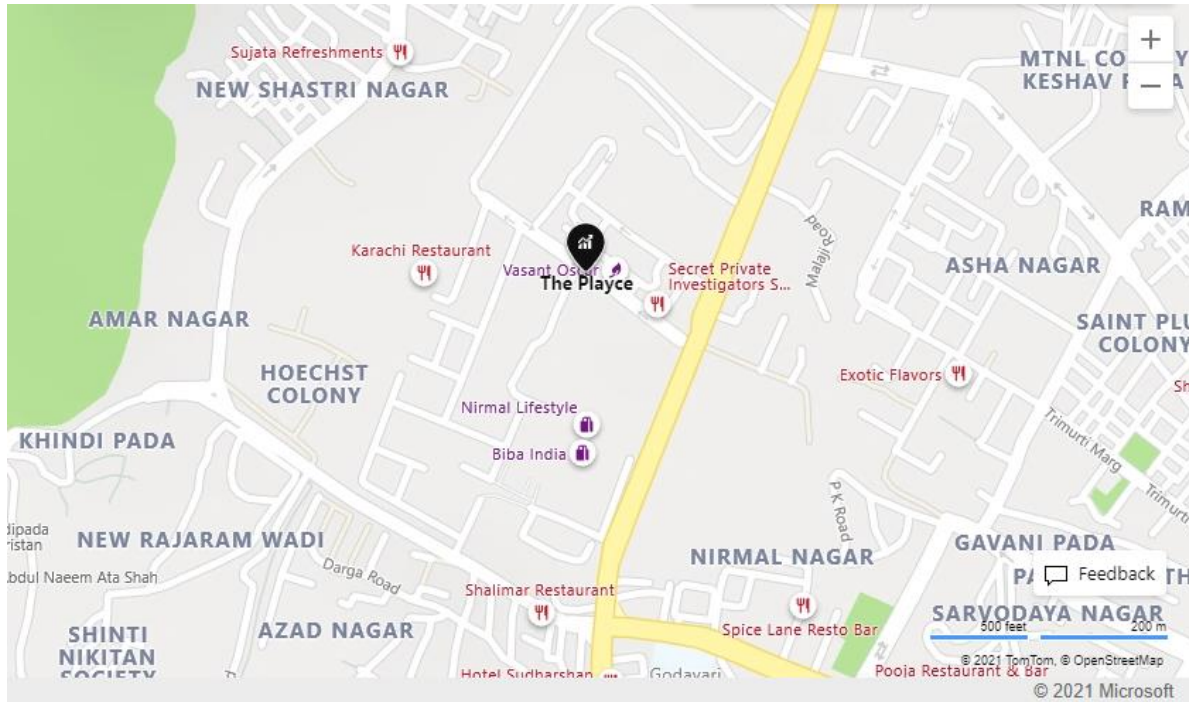
